If I Am Not For Myself

Journey of an Anti-Zionist Jew *Verso Books*

An eloquent and deeply felt memoir exploring the author's complex relationship with his Jewish identity. If I Am Not For Myself is a passionate, thought-provoking exploration of what it means to be Jewish in the twenty-first century.
