But these conflicts were not yet inextricably linked—and the United States remained at peace. Hitler's *American Gamble* recounts the five days that upended everything: December 7 to 11. A Dominican-born academic tells the story of how the Great Books transformed his life—and why they have the power to speak to people of all backgrounds What is the value of a liberal education?
